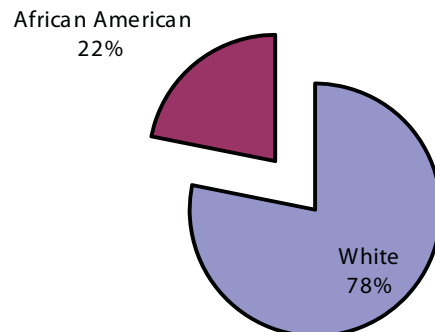

MARCH IN U.S. HISTORY (Source: Library of Congress)

March 2, 1899: President William McKinley signed legislation creating Mount Rainier National Park in Washington.

March 3, 1869: University of South Carolina opened to all races. Two Blacks B.A. Boseman and Francis L. Cardozo were elected to seven-man board of trustees.

March 4, 1861: Chief Justice Roger B. Taney administered the presidential oath of office, inaugurating Abraham Lincoln as the sixteenth president.

March 5, 1770: A Boston crowd skirmished with British troops quartered in the city in what was later known as the Boston Massacre.

March 8, 1884: Susan B. Anthony appeared before the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives to support an amendment which would grant women the right to vote.

March 9, 1966: Andrew F. Brimmer became the first Black governor of the Federal Reserve Board.

March 10, 1876: Alexander Graham Bell invented the telephone.

March 12, 1773: Jeanne Baptiste Pointe de Sable founded the settlement now known as Chicago, Illinois.

March 15, 1820: Maine entered the Union as the twenty-third state.

March 16, 1751: James Madison, Father of the Constitution and fourth president of the United States, was born.

March 18, 1782: John C. Calhoun, congressman, senator, secretary of war, secretary of state, and vice president of the United States, was born near Abbeville, South Carolina.

March 19, 1619: Birthday of William Tucker, the first African child born in the colonies.

March 26, 1910: William H. Lewis appointed Assistant Attorney General of the United States.

March 29, 1848: An enormous ice dam formed at the source of the Niagara River on the eastern shore of Lake Erie.

March 30, 1867: Secretary of State William H. Seward signed a treaty for the purchase of Alaska from Russia for seven million dollars.

March 31, 1917: The U.S. took formal possession of the Danish West Indies, later renamed the Virgin Islands.
